

2018 Highlights

What a successful year our community had! There were so many sustainable projects in 2018 that we can only highlight some of the achievements. A comprehensive listing of all the 2018 accomplishments reported by our partner organizations can be seen on our website.

Agriculture & Local Food

Eating local foods encourages sustainable agriculture and farmland preservation, supports local food growers and producers, and benefits the local economy.

On September 30th, in collaboration with the Township of Otonabee-South Monaghan, Hiawatha First Nation held the "Celebration of Mother Earth's Bounty of the Season Vendors' Market".



There are 14 Farmers' **Markets** in the Greater Peterborough Area.

The Havelock Farmer & Artisan Market started operation in 2018 in the **Township of Havelock-**Belmont-Methuen, and included special mid week pop-up markets.

Rocky Ridge Drinking Water improved and expanded their vegetable and fruit garden.

Transition Town Peterborough initiated the Downtown Culinary Hub, an annual initiative that brings recognition to local food producers and providers.



Over \$6,000 in Nourish Market Dollars were spent at local farmers' markets, providing dignified access to local food.

Tiny Greens Plant Café is Peterborough's first and only urban downtown farm! Recipient of the **Greater Peterborough Chamber of Commerce** 2018 Local Focus Excellence Award, Tiny Greens fuses urban farming inside an interactive plant shop and social hub.



Farms at Work coorganized 4 workshops, attended by 225 people, on protecting farmland and soil health.



The Sustainable Peterborough Future of Food and Farming Working Group



is striving to help strengthen the local food system in the City and County of Peterborough. On March 19th the 4th Summit, Planning Locally for the Future of Food and Farming, was held, with over 80 people in attendance! The Working Group also established farm liaison members with the Peterborough Agricultural Roundtable.

Climate Change

Reducing our contribution to climate change while increasing our ability to adapt to climate change conditions will contribute to a sustainable and resilient community.

As a result of community collaboration, the Peterborough Climate Reality Hub was established as a subcommittee of 4RG (For Our Grandchildren).

Fleming College became a member of the Sustainable Development Solutions Network Canada hosted by the University of Waterloo. Random Acts of Green launched a new mobile app that rewards people for "Acts of Green".

The Age-friendly Peterborough Plan, Sustainable Peterborough Plan, and the Climate Change Action Plan were embedded within the City of Peterborough's Asset Management Plan in 2018.





The Climate Change Action Plan (CCAP) completed the update against 2011 Corporate and Community Sector targets as of 2015 and commenced 2016 data collection for re-inventory.

The **Zero Heroes** program engaged **186 kids**, over **835 participant hours** of waste management education, reaching 372 family members.

The **Keep Cool** programs engaged **172 kids**, **625** participant hours of climate change and energy conservation, reaching 344 family members.



85% of families reported reducing food waste.



69% of families reported turning off lights, taking shorter showers, driving and idling less

Cultural Assets

Preserving and protecting our history, heritage and diverse local cultures is a necessary foundation for building sustainable communities.

The **New Canadians Centre** launched the "Living Library program" - newcomers sharing their stories of integration.

4th Line Theatre donated 100 tickets to the **New Canadians Centre to provide opportunities** for new Canadians to enjoy a show.

The **Township of Cavan Monaghan** launched the Municipal Heritage Recognition Award Program.

The **Township of Asphodel-Norwood** Cultural and Heritage Committee hosted a One Room School House exhibit that featured school artifacts. archival materials, and a mock school room.

Lang Pioneer Village Museum completed the



Peterborough County Agricultural Heritage Building, host to the Peterborough County Agricultural Wall of Fame.

Economic Development and Employment

Supporting existing local businesses, attracting new businesses, maintaining and growing local employment are all critical in building a strong, sustainable, resilient community.

The **Innovation Cluster** generated **\$15 million** dollars for the regional economy, supported **86 start-ups**, and helped to create **171 local jobs**.





Peterborough & the Kawarthas Economic Development continued to deliver results for entrepreneurs with support from the Government of Ontario with the Starter Company Plus

program. Since the program launched in 2017, it has supported **107 participants**, leading to the creation of **53 startup businesses**, expansion of **37 existing businesses**, and **110 new jobs**.

As part of the **Township of Douro-Dummer**'s ongoing efforts to attract business to the area, some parcels of land were pre-designated and pre-zoned as commercial.

Avant-Garden Shop supported **15 local artists** through free pop-up events.

Peterborough Airport (below) produces **74.03 million in GDP** annually, Airport businesses employ nearly **500 people**.



In collaboration with Community Futures
Peterborough, **Peterborough & The Kawarthas Economic Development** hosted
the Rural Business Summit.

Cambium was awarded Employer of the Year at the 2018 Business Excellence Awards hosted by the **Greater Peterborough Chamber of Commerce** for exemplifying excellence in its employee focus – job creation, hiring diversity, training & support, workplace wellness, commitment to professional/personal development, schedule flexibility to promote work-life balance, and community involvement.



The Sustainable Peterborough Business Initiative Working Group (SPBI)

supports local enterprises with the objective to educate, motivate and empower local businesses to become more sustainable. SPBI's online Toolkit provides insight and practical resources. In 2018 The Working Group hosted a motivational and educational Contractors & Home Builders Association Breakfast. SPBI also hosted the Green Business Zone at the Love Local Tradeshow featuring SPBI members and showcasing local business case studies.

Energy

It is important to reduce our energy consumption and maximize the production of renewable energy to reduce our impact on climate change.

The **Peterborough Sport and Wellness Centre** replaced existing pool pumps with energy efficient Variable Frequency Drives.



At the end of 2018. **Peterborough Distribution** Inc. were at 89% of their **2020 savings target**, with

33% savings achieved in 2018.

The Municipality of Trent Lakes installed remotely accessed thermostats and some automatic sensory lights to their facilities.

Asburnham Realty offers a monthly energy efficiency contest. Top energy efficient tenants receive gift cards, while tenants with high energy usage receive a reminder letter with energy efficiency tips.

Thanks to funding from the Canada 150 Community Infrastructure Program, the



Township of Douro-Dummer upgraded the heating and ventilation system in the Warsaw Community Centre, replaced uninsulated doors and insulated the Olympia Room.

Healthy Communities

A sustainable community is one where everyone has the opportunity and support to achieve their physical, social, mental, emotional and spiritual potential.



In 2018, Community Care delivered **37,649 meals** to 695 individuals, made 24,154 Reassurance Calls & Visits to **313 individuals**

to reduce social isolation, offered 50+ exercise and fall prevention classes, assisted 1,042 **individuals** with home help.

GreenUP constructed a new **Children's Education Shelter** (below) at Ecology Park.





Camp Kawartha partnered with the Hardwood Nature School and ran a weekly Forest Kindergarten; they logged 36 visits with 288 participants.

Curve Lake First Nation provides the Seniors Medical Transportation Service, offering seniors transportation on reserve to medical appointments and programming.



Fleming College launched Mentorship Miles, a "walking and talking" initiative designed to engage students by encouraging authentic connection while experiencing nature.

Nourish JustFood Box provided dignified access to affordable, healthy, and often local food. Delivered 3,187 boxes in 2018, feeding on a monthly average **295 adults** and 144 children.



In 2018 the **Healthy Kids Community Challenge (HKCC)** promoted the theme Power off and Play. 23 parents and 38 children participated in Nourish's Screen-Free Family Meals and Activities series. 1083 individuals attended Discovery Day events offered by Otonabee Conservation. 1800+ people took part in the Peterborough Public Library's summer programming.



HKCC Legacy Project: 52 Hopscotch stencils installed on 26 school playgrounds and 10 municipal and First Nation parks & **community centres** across the Greater Peterborough Area.

Land Use Planning

Planning policies and decisions must preserve the environment while also supporting the building of sustainable, healthy and diverse communities.



The **Municipality of Trent Lakes** Economic Development Committee, in collaboration with **Curve Lake First Nation,** established Ode`naang Park in Buckhorn. A previously vacant and neglected property bloomed into a beautiful shoreline park.



Kawartha Land Trust protects 17 properties covering 4101 acres of land.

The **Township of North Kawartha**'s Chandos Beach renovation provides more usable beach area, a seasonal accessible washroom, and included the planting of 10 Trees.

The **Township of Cavan Monaghan** adopted the Millbrook Community Improvement Plan.

Natural Assets

Preserving, enhancing and restoring natural assets is essential in maintaining ecological health.

Hiawatha First Nation held a Pollinator's Picnic at Serpent Mounds Park and released butterflies into their newly created pollinator, butterfly and traditional medicine gardens.



Peterborough Field Naturalists held over 35 outings in 2018, exploring a diverse range of habitats and species.



Curve Lake First

collaborated in the creation of turtle crossing signs, in English and Curve Lake dialect of Ojibwe, to help reduce

Day celebration was held at Curve Lake First Nation, where community members contributed their local knowledge by identifying areas of critical turtle habitat. Signage was also created to help users of the wetland boardwalk at Curve Lake First Nation identify local turtle species, and learn about their lifecycle and habitat.



Kawartha Land Trust held "Take Me Outside" day (above), where students from **Holy Cross Secondary School** participated in a full day of trail maintenance work.

In partnership with **GreenUP**, **Otonabee Conservation** and **Trent University**, **Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters** replaced invasive species with native plants behind Kawartha Heights Public School and at **Riverview Park and Zoo**.



In collaboration with the Lakefield & District Horticultural Society, the

Ennismore & District Horticultural Society,
Otonabee Conservation, and the Ontario
Turtle Conservation Centre, the Township of
Selwyn was declared the 18th Bee City in
Canada thereby committing to supporting
pollinator protection, establishing and
maintaining a healthy pollinator habitat.



Nearly **15,000 trees** were planted through the **Otonabee Conservation** tree seedling

sales program, stewardship activities and environmental education programs.

Peterborough Pollinators identified over 365 pollinator gardens in Peterborough

Three Sisters designed and installed 15 new pollinator gardens.

Transportation

A sustainable community has an accessible transportation network that places priority on active and efficient modes of transportation, and availability of EV chargers, to reduce emissions associated with driving.



The County of Peterborough partnered with the **City of Peterborough** and the **Township** of Selwyn for a safe cycling campaign - A Metre Matters - to promote active and

safe cycling throughout the region.

In partnership with Peterborough Transit, **GreenUP** runs the annual **Grade 8 Transit Quest** program to increase the familiarity of city youth with the public transit system. Every Grade 8 **student** in the City of Peterborough is provided with a free transit pass and map for March Break. **914 passes** were distributed in 2018!

The **Township of Selwyn**, in partnership with Curve Lake First Nation, Age-friendly Peterborough and Community Care, received \$1,488,400 in funding from the Government of Ontario to establish a pilot rural transportation system.



Transit One created **thebus.ca**, an online resource designed to improve access to transit information and reduce dependency on paper maps.



Downtown Peterborough was designated as a **Bicycle** Friendly Business Area by Ontario By Bike, one of five in the province!

Waste

Waste management practices need to better reflect processes found in nature; we must reduce the amount of waste we generate by repairing, reusing, repurposing and maximizing waste diversion.

In partnership with the Kawartha Truth and Reconciliation Support Group, and Honouring Indigenous People, Lang Pioneer Village **Museum** organized the Northern Bra Migration, a project that sends bras to remote Northern First Nation communities that have requested them. **1341 bras** were sent to 12 communities.

The **Township of North Kawartha** implemented Filehold, an electronic file management system, to reduce paper usage.





Siemens Canada Ltd., Peterborough installed 3 water bottle refill stations and replaced the single-use coffee cups in employee cafeteria with reusable mugs.

Community Care operates

5 "New To You" Thrift Shops generating \$60,000k+ for their programs annually, while helping to repurpose items and reduce waste.

Peterborough VegFest, in partnership with Rocky Ridge Drinking Water, provided a free water refill station.

The Township of Asphodel-Norwood implemented a textile and alcohol bottle/can collection depot at their Transfer Station.



Water

Water is a precious resource and we must work collectively as a community to protect its quantity and quality by conserving the amount of water we use and protecting watersheds.

The **Township of Havelock-Belmont-Methuen** replaced the water and sewer pipes on Union Street and Quebec Street.

The **County of Peterborough** launched the Clean Marine awareness program reinforcing



their commitment to enhanced environmental stewardship through public education, increased litter collection and recycling promotion.

The Township of Otonabee-South Monaghan performed energy efficiency upgrades, including variable speed drive pumps, for the Keene and Stewart Hall municipal drinking water systems.

With funding from Ontario Trillium Foundation, **GreenUP** established Wonders of Water (WOW), a water education program dedicated to sharing the importance of water into local classrooms and homes. WOW had 30 class visits and interacted with 330 students!



Camp Kawartha constructed a wheelchair accessible pathway for increased accessibility to their waterfront.

• Install rain barrels • Turn off the tap when brushing your teeth • Install a low flow toilet • Run full loads of dishes and laundry • Fix leaky faucets • Plant a rain garden
